EASTERN WHITE PINE:

Soft, light green blue needles. Tolerates dry, rocky soil as well as wet, swampy areas. Excellent ornamental for specimen tree, naturalizing, and windbreaks. Fast

grower. Can be used for Christmas trees and timber.

COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE:



EVERGREENS (bundles of 10)

Grows to 100' with silvery bluegreen needles usually less than an inch in length. It thrives in well drained or moist soils. Handsome ornamental in single planting or dense screen/ windbreak.

APPLE TREE BUNDLE (1 of EACH):

DAYBREAK[™] FUJI APPLE:

Fruit is large with a pink-red blush. Productivity of tree is exceptional. Ripens five weeks ahead of conventional Fuji, harvest in mid-September. Dwarf: 10'



GRANNY SMITH APPLE:



A late green, tart, apple maturing in early November. Develops red blush in the NE. High- quality eating apple. Storage life equal to Fuji. Semi-dwarf: 10-20'

FIRESTORM™ APPLE:

Strain of Honeycrisp. Improved red color. Harvest window is the same as original. Harvest mid-September. Dwarf: 10'



BELLAIRE PEACH:

Large fruit with excellent color and firmness. Trees are

vigorous and spreading. Excellent tolerance to bacterial spot. Harvest midlate August.



GLOWINGSTAR PEACH:



A medium to large freestone peach developed in Michigan that has excellent color and firmness. Trees are very winter hardy, productive and tolerant to bacterial spot.

RED OAK:



Fast growing. Grows 60-70' in height and spread. Grows best in sandy to rich loamy soils. Has good tolerance for salt and urban conditions. Valuable timber tree.

BLACK LOCUST:

Grows to 75'. Grows in poor and dry soils. Often used for erosion control. Nitrogen fixing, improves soil. Dense, rot resistant wood often used for fence posts and firewood. Small thorns when young.



PAWPAW (potted)

Mature height 12-25' with dense dangling foliage. Large edible fruit in clusters. Harvest mid-August to mid-October. Plant at least two trees to ensure cross pollination.



ROSEBAY RHODODENDRON (potted):



Height 8-12' with a spread of 6-8'. Reddish in bud, turning pink in late June. Large dark green evergreen leaves. Hybrid of *Rhododendron maximum* and 'Roseum Elegans'. Blooms in complete shade. Excellent for screening. Can also tolerate full or half day sun.

WINTERBERRY HOLLY:

Height and spread 6-10'. Prefers acidic soils, will tolerate wet swampy conditions. Bright red berries in winter. Diffult to distiguish between male and female



plants. Recommend planting at least 5 to ensure pollination.

NANNYBERRY VIBURNUM:



Medium grower 15-18'. Spread 6-10'. Flat cluster of flowers in late May. Purplish black berries in late fall and winter. Food for wildlife. Purple-red fall foliage. Good wetland variety.

WILDFLOWER & GRASS MIX W/ ANNUAL COVER:

A mix of native wildflowers & grasses with annuals mixed in for cover and color. Major species includes; sideoats grama, little bluestem, purple coneflower, blackeyed susan, and aster. Major



annuals include blue flax, indian blanket, and bundleflower. Majority of mix reaches 4-5' annually. For full species composition contact the District.

WILDLIFE FOOD PLOT MIX:



Provides habitat and food for a variety of wildlife. Mix includes; milo, millet, buckwheat, and sunflower. Attractive to mourning doves, turkey, and deer. Remains standing in winter to provide shelter and an

emergency food source. Seed in May or June.

5' TREE TUBE:

5' vented tree shelter. Provides protection from predators, wind, and chemical sprays. Promotes seedling growth. Attaches to stake with nylon ratchet ties.



2' SHRUB TUBE:



Provides protection from predators, wind, and chemical sprays. Promotes seedling growth. Attaches to stake with nylon ratchet ties. 2' high and approximately 5-6" in diameter.

5' OAK STAKE:

5' hardwood oak stake for anchoring tree and shrub shelters. Stakes are 1 inch thick with pointed end.

5' FIBERGLASS STAKE:

5' fiberglass stake for anchoring tree and shrub shelters.
